

VOTER'S REGISTRATION **WESTMORELAND COUNTY, PENNSYLVANIA**

Voter Registration Deadline:

The deadline for in-person voter registration is 30 days prior to each primary or election. Registration-by-mail forms **must be postmarked no later than the voter registration deadline** in order to be processed for the upcoming primary or election.

- * A voter's registration form and instructions have been provided for you in the "Useful Forms" section of this book.
- * All residents can register to vote at any driver's license center when they renew their driver's licenses, as part of the motor-voter law.
- * Residents can pick up voter registration forms at most post offices, public libraries, state liquor stores, state welfare offices and some Giant Eagle supermarkets.
- * You may also request a Voter Registration Mail Application by calling 1-800-552-VOTE.

Qualifications for Voter Registration

In order to be eligible to register to vote, you must:

- * Be a citizen of the United States for at least one month before the next election
- * Be a resident of Pennsylvania and your election district for at least 30 days before the next election
- * Be at least 18 years of age on the day of the next election; and

If you are currently registered to vote, you do not have to re-register unless you have moved, or wish to change your name or political party affiliation.

Am I Registered? Where Do I Vote?

If you need to know if you are registered to vote for this election or do not know the location of your polling place, please contact your local county board of elections.

General information

- * Voter registration ends 30 days before an election date or primary. This is also the last day for voters to register or change their names or addresses with the election bureau to vote in the general election each fall.
- * Parties registered in Pennsylvania: Democrat, Republican, Independent, Reform Party, No Party and Other.
- * During a primary, one must vote within their party (i.e.: A Democrat must vote for a Democrat, not a Republican).
- * During a general election, one can vote for any party, regardless of party affiliation.
- * Residents who have initiated their right to vote no longer are purged from the election bureau's files, but are placed on an inactive list.
